I am delighted to share a few remarks about Chairman Wow, Wayne Donaldson, and my reflections on him formed during my service to the ACHP under his leadership. I, of course, was the eternal rube among the Members. Being from West Virginia, I was ever awed of the credentials, sophistication and experience of my colleagues who labor daily in historic preservation, and, in particular, of the Chairs whom I served.

Wayne had arrived as Chair after the creative and dynamic years of Chairman Nau. In my estimation, the new Chair had a tough act to follow. But Wayne soon proved that he could work no less effectively than his predecessor and with as much passion for public service to the nation. Wayne early on emphasized the importance not only of preservation but of conservation. This marked me.

His ideas were borne, I believe, of his California culture and an ideal of holism toward the beauty and soul of both the

environment and the built environment. To a hillbilly like me, he had the mien of a gently aging surfer dude, who deeply cares about experiences, relationships, authenticity and, above all, people. He impressed me with his commitment to hearing voices and perspectives often less heard and much less sought. His tone of leadership was respectful, inspirational and heart-warming. I myself always had an affinity for the smart, dedicated, kind and superb staff of the ACHP. He did too. From the edges of any crowded room, I observed that he cared immensely about their views and their well-being. That's my type of leader.

The thing that I most admire about Wayne is his audacity, a trait manifested in his daring and unapologetic commitment to unusual neckwear. It can always be said of the outgoing Chair that Wayne Donaldson knows how to tie one on.

RENO KEONI FRANKLIN

I first became a Tribal Historic Preservation Officer (THPO) in 2002. I was the fifth THPO in the state of California. I was 29 and entered into a field that was still finding its identity here in California. I remember hearing from others that the relationship with the state was strained at best. The SHPO and the THPOs had never had a meeting in our great state.

In 2004 a new SHPO was appointed by the "Terminator," Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger. If you know California

Indian history, you know that anyone best known as the Terminator will likely not receive a warm reception in California. Our expectation for an appointment to a position of authority over the sacred sites and cultural places of tribes was not high. It was a time of struggle between the tribes and the governor, and we fully expected him to use this appointment as leverage for negotiations with tribes that were taking place. The tribes worried that our fears were confirmed when we were told the new SHPO was an architect.

It was under these circumstances that Mr. Milford Wayne Donaldson was introduced to Indian Country.

And so on a fall day in 2004, a scruffy headed surfer architect with a big heart and a strong will reached out to a couple of THPOs and asked for a meeting. His travel would be denied by the Terminator, leaving him to pay his own way and that of his trusted friend and tribal adviser, Mr. Dwight Dutschke. They made their way to Blue Lake to meet at a hotel owned by the Cher-Ae Heights Community of the Trinidad Rancheria to meet with the five California THPOs and some of our tribal leadership.

It was the first of many meetings and the beginning of a journey unlike any other in the history of California and the tribes who reside in it. It was the first time the state met with its historic preservation peers at the tribal level. We agreed the meetings would be held annually with the mission of finding commonalities and ways to support each other in the field of historic preservation. Fourteen years later, the meetings with the THPO and SHPO continue, although the numbers have changed (43 THPOs), the spirit of the meetings and the work remains the same, protect the sites. The number of resources protected as a result of these meetings is immeasurable.

On a personal note, I look forward to reflecting back on my own career when I have grown older. I will take stock in the many sites that were saved, the careers built on or helped by the tribal/state relationships that were formed, all because a scruffy headed surfer was naive enough to trust his gut instinct, and make a friend with a big Indian firefighter turned THPO. I can look at the doors that were opened that day back in 2004 when he reached out to us and smile. When the day comes that I meet with my Kashaya ancestors to show my work, I will speak his name to them. For a Kashaya man, there is no higher honor, and for Wayne, there is no more deserving person.




STELLA FIOTES

As the Department of Veterans Affairs designated representative to the ACHP, I've had the pleasure of working with Wayne during his time as chairman and appreciate his advocacy of practical solutions to complex situations. His willingness to push through, and sometimes go around, complicated bureaucratic processes has resulted in achieving common goals that seemed at times just beyond reach. In particular, his focus on utilizing existing authorities, including NHPA Section 111 and Enhanced Use Leasing, to address the increasing challenge of preserving vacant and no longer

needed historic buildings across the federal government led to the Secretary of VA approving creation of the Historic Reuse Program within my office. Wayne's persistence has moved VA from having a deteriorated WWII-era structure unsuitable for its own needs to recently selecting a developer to rehabilitate this waterfront property through a public-private partnership. VA's pilot Section 111 project is turning a stewardship liability into an economic asset in his home state of California. Thank you, Wayne.

ACHP AWARD FOR FEDERAL PRESERVE AMERICA ACCOMPLISHMENT

From 2006-2010, the ACHP Award for Federal Preserve America Accomplishment recognized federal projects, programs, initiatives, and policy leaders or career staff who contributed significantly to the promotion and advancement of the Preserve America program and related goals within the federal government, to the benefit of both the federal establishment and the general public.

Chairman Donaldson presented the final award in September 2010 to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (U.S. Forest Service) and the U.S. Department of the Interior (National Park Service and Bureau of Land Management) for outstanding support for Colorado Preserve America Youth Summits over a five-year period.

ACHP/HUD SECRETARY'S AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN HISTORIC PRESERVATION

The ACHP/HUD Secretary's Award for Excellence in Historic Preservation was a newly created joint award in 2017 with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to honor historic preservation efforts with affordable housing and community revitalization successes.

The first recipient of the award was TRF Development Partners' renovation of the East Baltimore Historic II community that transformed an entire neighborhood block within a stressed and disinvested housing market, spurring additional rehabilitation activity nearby. Partners included BUILD Baltimore; TD Bank; East Baltimore Development, Inc.; Baltimore Housing; the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development; and the Maryland Historical Trust.

NATIONAL TRUST/ACHP AWARD FOR FEDERAL PARTNERSHIPS IN HISTORIC PRESERVATION

The National Trust/ACHP Award for Federal Partnerships in Historic Preservation celebrated a project or program in which a federal agency and one or more non-federal partners achieved an exemplary preservation outcome. Winners were honored at the National Trust's annual preservation conference. This award ended in 2015, but Chairman Donaldson co-presented the award with President Stephanie Meeks four times. NATIONAL HISTORY TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

The National History Teacher of the Year Award is cosponsored by the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History, Preserve America, and HISTORY™. A \$10,000 prize winner is selected from a group of finalists from each state, the District of Columbia, and U.S. territories, who each receive \$1,000 and a core archive of history materials for his or her school library. The Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History created (in 2004 along with the ACHP) and administers this program. Chairman Donaldson was able to participate in the 2016 ceremony honoring Kevin Cline of Frankton, Indiana.
